Other things to remember in the new year:

- · Medicare continues to cover COVID-19 vaccines, tests and booster shots, if you're eligible.
- · You might be able to sign up for Medicare during a Special Enrollment Period if you missed your enrollment period because of certain exceptional circumstances.
- Beginning Jan. 1, when you

- sign up for Medicare the month you turn 65 or during the last 3 months of your Initial Enrollment Period, or during the General Enrollment Period, your coverage starts the first day of the month after you sign up.
- Medicare will offer a new benefit that helps continue to pay for immunosuppressive drugs beyond 36 months after a kidney transplant (if you don't have other health coverage).
- · Accountable Care Organizations are driving better health care An Accountable Care Organization is a group of doctors, hospitals, and other health care providers that work as a team to give you high-quality, coordinated health care. If your doctor is part of an Accountable Care Organization, it means they have tools that could

- lead to better care for you, and you may have access to additional services.
- · If you have limited income, you may be able to get help from your state to pay your Medicare costs through resources like Extra Help or a Medicare Savings Program.
- Your mental health and wellness are a high priority. If you or someone you know is in crisis, call or text 988, or chat 988lifeline.org.
