

## The difference between measuring results vs. outcomes in nonprofits

Measuring results and measuring outcomes in nonprofits are related concepts, but they focus on slightly different aspects of program evaluation and impact assessment. Here's the difference between the two:

## **Measuring Results:**

Measuring results typically refers to assessing a program or intervention's immediate outputs and achievements. Results are often more tangible and easier to quantify than outcomes. They are the direct products of the activities and efforts undertaken by a nonprofit. Examples of results might include:

- ✓ Number of workshops conducted
- ✓ Number of meals served
- ✓ Number of children vaccinated
- ✓ Number of training sessions held
- ✓ Number of participants attending an event

Measuring results is important for tracking the completion of tasks and activities, ensuring that resources are being used as intended, and gauging the overall implementation of a program.

## **Measuring Outcomes:**

Measuring outcomes involves evaluating the broader changes or impacts that result from a nonprofit's programs or interventions. Outcomes go beyond the immediate outputs and focus on the changes in knowledge, behavior, conditions, or circumstances resulting from the program. Outcomes are often more long-term and can be more challenging to measure accurately. Examples of outcomes might include:

- ✓ Increase in literacy rates among program participants
- ✓ Reduction in greenhouse gas emissions due to a conservation initiative
- ✓ Improvement in the health and well-being of a community after a healthcare intervention
- ✓ Increase in employability skills among program participants



Outcomes are the changes that a nonprofit seeks to achieve to create a positive and lasting impact on the individuals or communities they serve.

In essence, results are the immediate, tangible achievements that directly stem from the activities of a program, while outcomes are the broader changes in behavior, conditions, or circumstances that occur as a result of those activities. Both results and outcomes are crucial for understanding the effectiveness and impact of a nonprofit's work. While results provide insight into program implementation and resource utilization, outcomes offer a deeper understanding of the meaningful changes that are being brought about in the lives of beneficiaries or the community as a whole.
